PROGRAM Amateur Radio Satellites

Søren will share his experiences working satellites. He listened to Mir and Sputnik 2 back in the days, but did not become active on satellites until recently—he has worked satellites since July 2016.

Manny Block WØPIG, SK

Born in North Minneapolis in 1925, Manny died on August 3rd.

At age 10 Manny built his first crystal radio set, beginning a lifelong interest in radio. During World War II, he served on carriers USS Antietam and USS Bennington as an aircraft radioman. Upon discharge in 1946 he entered the University of Minnesota, graduating from the electrical engineering program in 1949. Through a 40-year career at Research Associates, Univac and Control Data he contributed to the development of main frame computers, computer systems onboard navy ships, and computer systems for the Apollo mission. Manny had a passion tor aviation. In the 1960s he earned a pilot's license then moved on to instruction and volunteer work in the Minnesota Civil Air Patrol, flying search-and-rescue missions and teaching young cadets to fly. Upon retirement from the computer industry he returned to the University, earning a PhD in vocational education at age 82 with a thesis addressing best practices in aviation instruction.

Membership Meeting September 7, 2018

Meeting was held in our new location: John R Albert Center Commons Room, Cretin-Derham Hall High School in St. Paul, courtesy of Brother Robert (Bob) Walsh (WCØJ).

President John Faughn (KDØCAC) called the meeting to order at 7:30 PM. We did the round of self introductions and had 35 members, 1 visitor and 1 guest presenter present.

Officer/committee reports included:

President's report – we need to put together a work party to remove the club's antennas and cables from the UST science building. He is trying to work out a suitable date with the UST staff. He also introduced Brother Robert (Bob) Walsh and thanked him for arranging our new meeting space.

VE team – Leon Dill (WØCOE) said they had a successful testing session on September 1st.

Treasurer's report – Allan Klein (WØNLY), via George Power (KØGCP), reported the General Fund balance is \$7460, the Education Fund balance is \$997 and the Repeater Fund balance is \$627.

Membership – Dale Maroushek (NØPEY) said our 2018-2019 count was above 20, with many renewals being turned in at tonight's meeting. At the end of last year (May, 2018) we had a membership count of 150.

Field Day results – Peter Guldan (KDØSQJ). reported that we had fewer points than last year (band conditions were poor), but lots of attendees came out to visit (including a GOTA participant who has now received her General class license). This was again held at the former Tartan Park site under somewhat more primitive conditions. Peter expressed willingness to chair next year.

Old Business:

Election of club officers – since last Spring's attempts at getting new officers did not work out, John tried another election session tonight. New officers: President Don Kelly (WA6ZMT), Vice-President Dale Maroushek, Treasurer Allan Klein (continuing), Secretary George Power. We are trying to resurrect our club's website – the hosting company was bought out and the contents did not transfer to the new hosting company smoothly. So the site is under construction with Don Kelly and Jay Maher (NJØM) working with Tom Bredemus.

Dale acknowledged Silent Keys Marty Gammel (KAØNAN), Manny Block (WØPIG), and Bill Beaman (KAØIYS).

Dale has taken over the 10-meter "friendly net" with the passing of Marty.

New Business:

Reminder that Bob's (KØIKV) Yard Sale is next Saturday (September 15) and that the St. Paul Radio Club is hosting it. If we can successfully sell the remaining club's inventory in the storage locker, we can close out the locker rental.

Dale was looking for volunteers to help with an antenna removal project on Sunday, September 16, starting around 9:30 AM. Contact him for details.

The business meeting was closed around 7:52 PM, and we took a short break for snacks and raffle ticket sales.

Our program tonight featured Matt Holden (KØBBC). He gave us an update on the activities at the ARRL headquarters, especially the changes coming to the ARES program within ARRL. He then gave us a live demonstration of remote operation of some of the larger rental stations available to us. He described some of the stations available to us, and the costs of using them (rental fees ranging from \$0.09 to \$0.99 per minute). When the apartment/condo dwellers amongst us have no effective antennas to use, these sites provide an alternative. Matt stayed after the presentation to answer questions.

The raffle concluded our meeting, which ended about 9:20 PM.

End Fed Half Wave Antennas Scott Holisky, NØAR

The dipole is the "go to" antenna for most of us. We cut our teeth adjusting them. Then we wondered how to get more bands from the

wire. It seems the new discovery of feeding a dipole from the end is all the rage. From one wire all the bands, too good to be true? Maybe, or it might be just what you need.

Like the Handbook shows, the ends of a dipole are the high impedance point. This means that you have to do some matching to make your radio see the 50 ohm antenna that it is designed to work into. Enter the magic box that converts that. What's inside? Nothing more than a low loss broadband transformer wound to a 49:1 ratio.

The advantage of feeding the end of the dipole is the different configurations it allows you to run the wire. You only need one support and the wire doesn't have to run in a straight line. No coax hanging in the air either, the antenna can be almost invisible. For portable operation this is a desirable antenna to have in your bag of tricks. For home use, having a wire tossed over that big old Oak tree that works multiple bands is big plus.

The lowest band you can work with a half wave antenna is the length that it is a half wave wire. So a 67 foot wire will work on 40, 20 and up. It will not work on 80 meters since it's half as long as it is needed to be.

I've used the EFHW antenna for years in one form or another. I can say it is a solid performer; after all it's our "go to" dipole.

QST has several different manufactured units for sale. Facebook has a group dedicated to making and using EFHW's, YouTube sports several EFHW videos. There are multiple sites that offer how-to on winding your own for whatever power level you run. Winter is almost here and you need a project, here you go.

ARRL president suggests we **Rebrand Amateur Radio** Dan Romanchik, KB6NU

This Week in Amateur Radio recently reported (https:// www.stitcher.com/podcast/thisweek-in-amateur-radio/ e/51325707) on a speech given by ARRL president, Rick Roderick, K5UR, at the 60th annual West Virginia State ARRL convention held August 25th at WVU Jackson's Mill Conference Center. Here are some things that he had to say:

"Are we even relevant anymore as ham radio operators? Well, let's see: We're world communicators. We provide public service. We help in emergencies and disasters. We help save lives. We talk to the jungles of Africa...to the beaches of the South Pacific. We bounce signals off the moon. We talk to astronauts. We promote technology. We do positive things. So absolutely—we are relevant.

"We've got to accept change and we've got to adapt if we're going to bridge that gap to that next generation. So the question that I have here that I have challenged my colleagues at ARRL with is this: is it time to rebrand ham radio? Maybe we need to rebrand the American Radio Relay League. That's a pretty profound statement."

Of course, I agree with K5UR on this and said so myself (https:// www.kb6nu.com/are-we-amateurs -or-what/) several years ago. Unfortunately, according to the report, he retreated to the same old ideas that the ARRL has been spouting for years:

"Well I think we ought to get out there and stir things up. That's what I think we ought to do. I think you ought to go back and rejuvenate your club. Over the next year, get somebody into ham radio. The second thing I want you to do....I want you to help a ham that needs your help. And the third thing I want you to do is—if you're not a member of the American Radio Relay League, you need to join today...because you know that whether you like us or not, we're all you've got; ain't nobody else in Washington DC helping us. I want you to ask yourself this question: don't you think it's time to give something back? Now I believe as a group, if we all did that we'll make a difference in this hobby as we go forward. Be a champion of ham radio. Let's work together and get it done. Thank you very much."

I'd like to challenge K5UR and the ARRL to really stir things up. There are lots of us out here giving back by teaching classes, conducting exam sessions, and helping hams get on the air. That's not the problem.

What we need from the ARRL is real leadership, not just talk. Exhorting the troops is only going to go so far. For most hams, amateur radio is only a hobby, and they do what they can. It's really up to the ARRL to provide the leadership that ties it all together and provide the framework that will allow us all to be successful.

Saying, "Whether you like us or not, we're all you've got; ain't nobody else in Washington DC helping us" doesn't really cut it. You have to show people that you're really making a difference, not just say you are.
